

# James' letter

- James was probably Jesus' brother.
  - Initially slow to believe in Jesus (John 7:5), by his time of writing (~50s AD) it seems James was the leader of the church in Jerusalem.
- After Stephen was stoned (30s AD) the members of the Jerusalem church were scattered "throughout Judea and Samaria" (Acts 8:1).
- Subsequently, James will have picked up from travellers how these scattered (largely Jewish (James 1:1)) Christians were getting on.
- His letter is probably to them. He majors on helping them in their challenges, rather than laying out a comprehensive theology.
- The topics he addresses sound remarkably familiar to modern ears!



#### New life is for new living

"Do not merely listen to the word, and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says. Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like someone who looks at his face in a mirror and,

after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like. But whoever looks intently into the perfect law that gives freedom and continues in it – not forgetting what they have heard but doing it – they will be blessed in what they do." (James 1:22-25)

- "Not just cerebral or credal: (in the bible) nothing is *known* until it also reshapes us." (Alec Motyer) AC students.
- James then *earths* these words into his first readers' lives, and ours!

# Tom Wright on practicalities

"Hope' ... is not a feeling. It is a virtue. You have to practice it, like a difficult piece on the violin or a tricky shot at tennis. You practice the virtue of hope through worship and prayer, through

invoking the One God, through reading and re-imagining the scriptural story, and through consciously holding the unknown future within the unshakable divine promises." (Tom Wright)


- Something similar could be said of trusting God or knowing God's love, and aspects of godly living such as living wisely, maturing through trouble and training the tongue.


# Doers of the word: God's plan

• "For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." (Ephesians 2:10)

• "For Christ's love compels us... he died for all, that

those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again." (2 Corinthians 5:14-15)

- "... for it is God who works in you to will and to act in order to fulfil his good purpose." (Philippians 2:13)
- "... that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God," (Col 1:10)
- "His divine power has given us everything we need for a godly life ... (and) given us his very great and precious promises, so that through them you may participate in the divine nature" (2 Peter 1:3-4)




# Purpose (motivation; incentive)



 <u>Not</u> to win God's approval: "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith – and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God – **not by works**, so that no one can boast. For we are

God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus **to do good works**, which God prepared in advance for us to do." (Ephesians 2:8-10)


- "For Christ's love compels us..." (2 Corinthians 5:14a).
  Salvation is grace (unmerited favour of God); ethics is gratitude.
- "Find out what pleases the Lord" (Ephesians 5:10).
- For God's reward and "well done". (Colossians 3:24; Matthew 25:21) Lucy's knitting (again!)





# Partnership 2

- To trust God is to live and make decisions on the basis of him being trustworthy. It's not a feeling. Expecting God to deliver my preferred outcomes is <u>not</u> trusting God.
- We grow in trusting God like we grow in trusting a person: a little at a time. We trust him / them with increasing confidence as we increasingly find him / them to be trustworthy. Elephant stakes.

### Perseverance

- Growing / maturing / changing / breaking old habits / creating new habits is gradual: it takes intention, time and effort. AC kitchen.
- Practice = <u>both</u> what you customarily do, <u>and</u> learning to customarily do it. AC GP.
- "Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything." (James 1:4)
- You don't sow and reap on the same day. "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up." (Galatians 6:9) James' framed bible verse.
- Trust God for the fruit: focus on faithfulness. Claire's & Jane's diets.
